Glasgow 2014 Update

You will have noticed that I have been blackmailed into writing a few words in recent editions about the Glasgow Commonwealth Games? If sport isn't your "thing" then you may already be bored of sport in 2014 – it's a busy year for a variety of sports in Scotland – obviously the Commonwealth Games, but add in the Ryder Cup, no doubt more "Murray mania", and of course the Blair Drummond Curling Club annual "Points" competition. The latter being of course one not to miss!

I am fortunate to work in sport, and therefore 2014 offers great opportunities. That starts for us in athletics this weekend - the first time that a Scottish Team has competed at the annual "Indoor Athletics International". This is a team competition - 4 teams competing across most indoor events - on the banked track at the new Emirates Arena, also with "field" events such as Long Jump, Pole Vault, and High Jump in the middle. A 5000 sell-out crowd sets the scene for what will also be a full Hampden park for the athletics at the Commonwealth Games this summer. This weekend also raises the spectre of sport, hinting at the battle that follows in the political world later this year (the Referendum) - we have a Scotland vs. Great Britain clash this Saturday. I promise the Scots will do their best (other teams are USA and the Commonwealth) but it'll be tough (I'm writing this before the event deliberately - I don't have to defend a losing performance that way!). Alex Salmon has been asked for a pre-match team talk not sure if David Cameron will do the same for Team GB!

So what about the Commonwealth Games? Well, most of the facilities are ready – or at least built! There is always a significant amount of venues "dressing" for a major event – so even venues that have been open for some time (like the velodrome), will be dressed up for the Games and feel quite

different to usual. For athletics, Hampden Park is now closed to football, the pitch has been ripped up taken away and it looks like a building site in the stadium, as the "stage" is constructed. That "stage" is a platform raising the main pitch area by about 9 feet, on top of which goes hardcore, tarmac, and then a top quality track surface, with grass in the middle. It's a world first – and has been tested on a small scale best if I don't say anything else on that front right now – except fingers crossed it'll be fine!!

We have selected (very early) about half of the team we expect to take to the 'Commonwealths'. The remaining team members have until June 10th then its name the final team and get them ready. We are running a holding / pre games camp in Kilmarnock – options such as Portugal were attractive and considered, but the allure of Kilmarnock was just too much! There are great facilities there and no time zones to adapt to when moving into the athlete village. We think the temperature and humidity will be similar to Glasgow as well!

Then for me, it's about "media management". Can we make sure, whatever the success of Scottish athletes at Hampden Park (or in the marathons), the media perceive that we have been successful? That won't be easy – good news stories don't sell papers the same way as negativity but we will see if we can make sure there is at least a balance in the reporting. I expect the Grapevine to reflect fairly on the Scottish Team performance – balanced journalism as always from a quality broadsheet!

And then - well, sport carries on. There will be competitions the week after the Commonwealth Games have finished – we have a European Championships almost straight after the Games, and also Scottish national Championships to organise – they are more for the 11,000 or so members of athletics clubs across the length & breadth of Scotland, but are fiercely contested. So holiday don't tell the family, but not very much and not really in July or August!



Editorial

From one extreme to the other! Sunny and dry to rainy and boggy. The remorseless law of averages.

After the three glorious months of June, July and August when we averaged only 1.9 inches of rain per month and had average day temperatures of around 20C, with a high of 29.2C on 7 July, one tends to forget that over the last 10 years the average annual rainfall in the Blair Drummond area has increased by just over 2 inches per annum. Certainly December's 8.3" was a soaking reminder, when over one fifth of 2013's rainfall fell. (The 100 years average annual rainfall in Blair Drummond is about 38.5 inches, with the average annual rainfall for the last 10 years being 40.7 - the lowest was in 2003 when only 30 inches fell - the highest in 2012 when we suffered 52 inches.) Was this summer the return of a welcome norm or a freak one off? Will the Carse now have at least 2 to 3 months each year when it is completely dry and firm, enabling today's heavier farm machinery onto the land without bogging? Let us hope this dry summer period will become a norm but if not it is worth thinking about how to ameliorate the flooding problems which have occurred over the last few years and are apparent at the present time.

Historically the solution to flooding problems was to dig deeper and straighter ditches and drains, or to build flood embankments to protect specific areas of land. Embankments can of course simply transfer the problem elsewhere, or if they are breached cause even more serious problems as occurred with the Tay above Dunkeld a few years ago. Also where land is nearly at sea level and seas may be rising, thus reducing runoff this approach cannot be a complete answer.

Flooding can also be reduced by a "rain catchment area approach". For example areas of upland peat and heather moorland can be left undrained (or existing drains blocked) so that run-off to lower productive ground is reduced. Obviously this could be to the detriment of upland grazing and game. Trees catch rain, increase evaporation and slow the remaining water entering burns and rivers. Also if possible clear felling

should be avoided and trees planted on higher ground and alongside burns and rivers. As a principle, if necessary, better productive land should be protected at the expense of poorer land. Really poor unproductive ground may be able to be turned into catchment ponds or wetlands preventing or slowing water build up on good land, or land on which there is housing and building. Maintaining ground cover during winter months also helps absorb water, encourage evaporation and avoid or reduce the risks of creating semi-permanent pools or fast run off and flooding elsewhere. Studies indicate how a combination of the foregoing measures might be used to manage the possibility or probability of increasing rainfall and higher seas affecting the water situation on the Carse. Solutions may require co-operation and understanding from all concerned.

The Rev's Rant

Define ' **COMMUNITY**'!



If asked by the editor of a new Scottish Dictionary being published, to create a definition of 'Community', where would you begin?

One sociologist stated that there are 94 definitions, all inadequate. It seems that 'Community' is one of these Godtype words which people use, but nobody defines, assuming that everybody else knows what they are talking about. Not so! I've a minister friend who often says to folk who tell him that they are atheists and don't believe in God: "Tell me about the god you don't believe in — I probably don't believe in her either!" For me real community is not defined by name or boundaries on a map, but rather by how people interact.

Community values difference, rather than ostracising folk because they are not the same as everybody else, and gives folk an opportunity to display, employ and encourage individual gifts and ideas.

Communities don't have members on a list somewhere that is fixed, and requires approval by other members; it's a permeable fuzzy-edged collection of participants, who feel they are part of an evolving set with a shared responsibility for the well-being and growth of others who happen to be there at the time. You don't have to agree with everyone else. You don't apply to a community, join it or have to stay in it for months, or sometimes decades, before you're accepted; instead you sense your belonging and that of others. Words like status, wealth or age have little weight in a community.

Thank God, Blair Drummond is a community in every sense of the word, but don't just thank God, for communities need to be tended and treasured.

Camphill Blair Drummond held their annual Autumn Fair for the second time ever on Tuesday 29th and Wednesday 30th October 2013. This year, over 400 visitors attended and received a very warm welcome, enjoying wandering around the stalls provided by traders from Stirling and other nearby places. We are absolutely delighted that this year the fair raised over £9,000 in just two days.

Our Advent sale was also a fantastic success, with more people than ever before coming along to see what we had on offer. We raised £8,326, we had lots of great gifts, which our residents and day students had been hard at work making in the run up to the sale.

Elsie Riley, Regional Fundraising Manager, said, "I just wanted to say a really heartfelt thank you to everyone who came along, we were absolutely thrilled with the turnout and the funds raised from both events. What an amazing success for Camphill Blair Drummond. Every penny raised at our fairs will go to towards building new houses and workshops, so that we can secure our future and improve the quality of life for existing residents, as well as welcoming new residents." Thornhill & Blair Drummond Community Council

Elections – In October 2013 Community Council elections were held. Seven local people put their names forward and were duly elected. They are Kate Anderson, Fred Bauer, Brian Devlin, James Maxwell, Isabel MacAlpine, Ann Petrie and Peter Rickard. At our inaugural meeting chaired by a member of Stirling Council, we were informed of our duties, James Maxwell and Brian Devlin were elected as Chairman and Treasurer respectively and we proceeded to business. Peter Rickard is continuing as Secretary on a temporary basis but we are hoping to appoint a new Secretary in the next month or so.

Waste & recycling collections – We were pleased to have the chance to discuss bin collections with David Hopper of Stirling Council, at our December meeting. He apologised for the disruptions we all experienced in the autumn but defended the Council's position to cut brown bin collections early. He was supplied with many examples of what appears to us as a very

inefficient service, where bins are not collected on the day they should be, not collected at all for several weeks, collected the day before they are due to be, and others. He spoke of the budget proposals to only collect bins 4-weekly, rather than fortnightly and even a possible future where we may be asked to pay to have our brown bins collected. The meeting left him in little doubt about concerns over the service.

Broadband – We are being told that Thornhill will be included in a faster broadband service that should be available in 2015. How this will affect outlying properties is unclear.

Stirling Council Budgeting – Community Councillors have attended sessions run by the Council to explain and discuss this budgeting process for the next 5 years. They need to save £29 million over that period, from a current budget of about £200 million. While efficiencies will be pursued, a lot of the savings are proposed to come from reduced and even removed services. We have been assured that there are no plans to close any schools but rural transport may be at risk, as well as reduced bin collections, road end bin collections, reduced or curtailed library services, reduced grass cutting, reduced path maintenance, closure of public conveniences etc.

Kirk Lane Traffic Signs – We have previously asked Stirling Council to consider a barrier being erected at the south end of Kirk Lane, where the road bends right and cars have been known to leave the road. We were concerned over vehicles hitting the trees there or even plunging into the river. The Council has now erected warning chevrons at this point on the road.

Next meeting – We meet every 6 weeks, on Tuesdays, and our next meeting will be 11th March in Thornhill Primary School. All are welcome.
