### **Down our Way**

(An occasional series of interviews with local people)

The Royal Highland Show (RHS) brings together people from all over the world to enjoy a unique experience, and many take part in a range of competitions at a high level. Blair Drummond has the pleasure of having 2 brothers achieving top prizes at this prestigious event.

John Graham (18 years) won the Stockman of the Year plus (alongside Scott Duncan), Best Junior Team for Beef, Sheep & Dairy. His brother James (17 years) won Highest Individual Sheep Section plus (alongside David McKerrow), Winners of the Sheep Pairs. What a success story for the sons of Lynda and Douglas Graham of Mains of Burnbank Farm!

John kindly provided us with an insight into what's involved for them.

### Q: How did you get involved?

**A:** We got a message from the Young Farmers Club (YF) about a stock judging event and we went along with our pals. We got on quite well in our provision of reasons for our decisions and it just went on from there. I began at around 15 years and James at 13 years old.

### Q: What does it involve?

**A**: There are various classes of animals, with 4 in each, labelled ABXY. We must put them in the order of which we think are best (and the master judge has already made his choices too). Provision of the differing aspects of the animals must also be given. At the RHS Senior Section we've also to provide verbal reasoning for our choices. If our valid points differ from the judge, they could be upheld and we may still achieve a good score.

### Q: How did you lead up to the RHS?

**A:** We began training in February and practiced every week. Each year there are 4 breeds selected from each sector, which change from year to year. There are 4 beef, 4 sheep and 4 dairy classes to judge at each practice. Our trainers, who know the quality required, provide us with feedback on our decisions. 20 of the district YF trained for the RHS this year, the teams of 2 are reached through the amalgamated scores and trainers' opinions, and they decide which teams are to enter. We train as a district not a club.

# Q: What did the Day at the RHS involve for you?

**A:** In the morning 225 stock judgers met at the YF centre at the RHS to take part and were given a briefing. We were split into groups and into breed teams. The top 6 from each who went through to qualify in the afternoon then had to judge beef, sheep and dairy and give a set of reasons for each. Thereafter, we had to give a verbal stock demonstration to the judges, on lineage and comparison to an 'ideal' animal. There was an exam paper to complete, which was marked out of 100, with questions on the beef, sheep and dairy industry, medication, rules and regulations etc.

# Q: Do you get nervous beforehand?

**A:** Yes, I get horrendously nervous but on the other hand James is more relaxed about it all!

Q: Are the same skills required for each competition?

A: Yes.

### Q: And what now?

A: Well, though I was the second youngest ever to win Stockman of the Year, I can't re-enter at the RHS again, so I've 'retired'! I can in future be a trainer or judge. I've already judged this summer at Neilston and am judging soon at Dalmally. I'm still keen on all the YF events too.

James on the other hand can compete in all the different areas at the RHS and intends to do so in future.



It was a pleasure to interview John and we wish him and his brother James well in their future, which will no doubt be successful, given their hard work and dedication.

### Youth Club


Well, it's getting near that time of year again, when Tuesday nights in Blair Drummond hall are filled with the sounds of teenagers....that's right its youth club time again!!

# **Blair Drummond Curling Club**

### **David (Davie) Arnott.**

Blair Drummond Curling Club and Davie were inextricably linked over many years, with Davie serving as Club President, up until he passed away on 23 May 2015, aged 85.

Davie started his curling as a young man. His curling colleagues included John McBeath, John Sands and Jim Brisbane. He was noted for his encouragement of new curlers of any age. When the Falkirk Ice Rink closed in 1979 and club members had to travel to Kinross, it was Davie that kept the Club going and canvassed for the construction of a new ice rink at Williamfield, which opened in 1981/82. Davie represented Scotland in several curling competitions in Switzerland.

In 1979, Davie worked tirelessly to prepare the ice for the Grand Match at the Lake of Menteith, as can be seen from the following article –

"By February the 4th and in freezing cold weather (one of the most severe winters since WWII, remember!), Mr. Hamilton had transported the marking equipment from Loch Leven to the Lake of Menteith (not a quick journey even in good weather, but in those days with so few motorway links between the two venues, even less so), and on Monday the 5th he commenced marking 'with two squads (25 in each) led by Willie Wilson

and Dave Arnott.'

Mr. Hamilton records in his final report in the 1979–80 Royal Club Annual: 'We required a minimum of 50 workers and I made only six telephone calls that evening. On Monday morning, at 9am 60 workers turned up, many of them well known curlers who I am sure do little manual labour at home, but who were prepared to take off their jackets and work all day for the Grand Match.'

The work involved becomes very clear when you look at the many aerial photos of the Match – the area covered is truly huge."

As well as his curling skills, Davie also possessed a great tenor voice and along with his daughter Jean, he sang the "Crookit Bawbee" on many occasions at the old Blair Drummond Hall. He enjoyed singing and reciting at Burns Suppers over the years. He also attended the 'Youth Club' as he called it, which was a weekly meeting of retired farmers at The Lion and Unicorn, in Thornhill. His hearty laugh could be heard amidst the banter over lunch and drinks.

Agriculture was Davie's other passion, farming pigs, beef cattle and sheep, at South Kirklane Farm, all his married life for over 50 years. He was actively involved in the Scottish Timothy Seed Growers Association, being Secretary for over 10 years. Neighbours and friends recollect his dedication to his family, the community and his good sense of humour.

The Blair Drummond Curling Club owe Davie a debt of gratitude, for all his input and commitment to the Club and will long be remembered by club members.

# **Our Local Champion!**



On the 12<sup>th</sup> of July, I travelled along with many of the best youth cyclists from all over Britain to Paisley, to race in the biggest event in the British youth cycling calendar. It was the National Youth Circuit Championships, coming to Scotland for the very first time. It was set to be a great day of racing, on an amazing circuit that had a hill, a fast descent and dozens of fast, tight corners, all in the 3 minutes lap.

The younger riders raced early in the day in the sun but as the under 14s were racing it began to pour with rain. There had been a number of crashes already but there were many more in the rain.

My race was at 2:30pm, and although it had stopped raining, the course was still soaking and potentially very dodgy. So dodgy in fact that the first half lap of my race was neutralised behind a motorbike, to make sure everyone knew the course and weren't going to go crashing into barriers straight off the start line. Nice idea, but about 400 metres after the motorbike had pulled off; we had the first crash, going around what was being called "crash corner". One of the girls next to me slid out, took out one of my fellow Scots and I had to do a quick jump over wheels to stay upright and at the front of the race. With another crash just over a lap later, it was going to be an interesting race!

As it was the British champs, the strongest girls weren't going to let anyone away on an attack, they just weren't going to take the risk and any attacks were quickly snuffed out. It did seem like it was going to come down to a bunch sprint, with Welsh rider Jess Roberts looking likely to take the win.

Except it was my home champs, or as near as it was going to get, and I didn't fancy just rolling in to finish somewhere not really worth mentioning. The whole race was 60 minutes plus 3 laps, and with just over 5 laps to go, as we went up the hill, I attacked. I smashed it up the hill, away from everyone and just didn't look back. I was away for a lap before the group caught me at the bottom of the hill. When we hit crash corner, just half a lap later, I attacked again. This time I was caught on the ramp that rose up to the finish line. With just 4 laps to go, it looked more than ever like it would come down to a sprint.

So going up the hill on the penultimate lap, I took what was very generously called "not only the move of the race, but also perhaps the bravest decision of the whole day" by the Scottish Cycling report, and attacked for the third time. I didn't look back but the entire time I was convinced that I would be caught any second. This was the British champs, I was going to put all my effort in here and if I was caught, there was nothing more I could have done. Except I didn't get caught! The atmosphere was electric as I came across the line with a lap to go, everyone, whether they were a cyclist or just someone who was out and came to watch the race, was shouting and cheering for the Scot who was leading the race.

I kept going and as I came up the final straight I looked behind me for the first time, the bunch were very close and they were sprinting faster than I was riding. But they weren't close or fast enough and I was able to lift both my hands off the bars to celebrate as I crossed the finish line. The crowd, full of Scots, absolutely exploded into the loudest cheer of the day. I couldn't believe it, I was the British National Criterium Champion! I got so many hugs after that race I was concerned I would be disqualified because it was taking me so long to get back to the start line to have my gears checked. Then we had the podium presentation. When I was presented with my red, white and blue striped jersey of the British Champion and my gold medal, everyone watching was cheering really loudly.

It was a great moment, one I will never forget, as I crossed the finish line. Results like that don't come along all that often but every so often they do.

Then it was time to go home and the fun really started, with cars being pulled from the muddy fields, including the Red Cross Ambulance! Hats off to the Car Park Stewards who multi-tasked the whole day.

# What is the 'Thornhill and Blair Drummond Community Council'?

Some of us may know people who are members of the Thornhill and Blair Drummond Community Council, but perhaps not many of us know what our local Community Council (CC) is all about. Community Councils have existed in Scotland since 1973 and, under legislation, every local community has the right to petition for the establishment of its own CC. Our CC represents roughly 1200 people in an area covering 57 square kilometres.

Section 51(2) of The Local Government (Scotland) Act 1973 states that "....the general purpose of a community council shall be to ascertain, coordinate and express to the local authorities...and public authorities...the views of the community which it represents, in relation to matters for which those authorities are responsible, and to take such action in the interests of that community as appears to it to be expedient and practicable."

CCs have a statutory right to be consulted on planning applications. The CC is the voice of its local area, which means it is charged with articulating the views of local residents to their local authority, in regard to issues of public concern. The CC may bring to the attention of other public and private bodies matters within its sphere of interest, and it is essential that these views should be an accurate representation of the community's views. CCs may carry out other activities that are in the general interest of their local communities, providing they fall within the objects of their own constitution. A model constitution used nationally, forms the basis of this, and it then has to be approved by the local authority for the area.

### Who is eligible to stand for election to the CC?

Elections to the CC are held every 4 years, and candidates must be at least 16 years old live in the local area and be included on The Electoral Register for that area. A proposer and seconder are required, both of whom must be named on the local Electoral Register.

Although the next election of officers to the CC will not take place until 2017, meetings are held regularly and anyone is welcome to attend. In fact anyone interested in what is happening locally is encouraged to do so and perhaps to consider joining the council themselves in the future.

What local issues are of concern to our Community Council?
Recent matters under consideration are: the proposed development of
Drip Farm into an industrial-scale dairy and bottle processing plant which

it is estimated will offer 500 extra jobs to the area and apprenticeships to students at Forth Valley College in Stirling. The proposed development will cover an area roughly 3 times the size of the Auction Market and presents questions regarding traffic into and out of the site on the A84 near the Chalmerston Road roundabout. As with any proposed development there are arguments for and against, and the Community Council will endeavour to represent the opinions of all residents in the area.

The narrow entrance to Kincardine-in-Menteith School, which made it difficult for minibuses to turn in, was another matter that was resolved by widening the access on the A84. Stirling Council following petitioning by the Community Council recently carried out this work.

Blair Drummond residents, unlike their neighbours in surrounding areas such as Doune and Gargunnock, are affected by very poor Internet connection. This is perhaps an issue that the Community Council might be able to address in the future. Maybe you have concerns about other matters too? Why not bring them along to a meeting or contact your local CC Chairman (James Maxwell at <a href="mailto:secretary@thandbdcc.org.uk">secretary@thandbdcc.org.uk</a>) or one of the local representatives. The more of us who express our views the more likely we are to effect positive change in our local community. Next CC meeting - 11th August at 7.30pm in Blair Drummond Community Hall.

# The Carse of Stirling Partnership

Following the public meeting at Briarlands on 18 May about Flood Risk Management, organised by the Partnership in conjunction with Heriot Watt University and the James Hutton Institute, several of you have asked 'what is the Partnership?'

The Partnership arose from work commissioned by Scottish Natural Heritage and the Scottish Environmental Protection Agency – names that raise a variety of differing emotions in differing people! Panel meetings of all interested people living in the area (which in essence comprises the catchment areas of the Forth and that part of the Teith from Callander to the M9) were asked to list the benefits provided by the area, from the very nature of its land and topography, with the aim of maintaining and enhancing those benefits in an environmentally friendly and sustainable way.

The main benefits of the Carse area, which came out of these panel sessions, were:

**Food Production** – no surprise that this was the most important:

**Scenic qualities and sense of peace** – again no surprise for those of us living in the Blair Drummond community – the Carse is a great place to live:

**Wildlife and habitat** – the Carse is the natural home for a rich bird life and variety of habitats naturally produced by its farms, rivers, wetlands, woods, hedges and moors:

**Pollination** – importance of the relationship between bees and other pollinating insects and the fertilisation of arable and other crops:

**Recreation and tourism** – in addition to the more formal visitor attractions at the Safari Park, Briarlands, Inchmahome Priory and the like, the area provides opportunities for core paths and other walking, cycling and riding routes:

**Carbon storage** – in relation to global warming the increasing importance of peat, trees, permanent grassland and rotation crops (very much including Timothy Hay), in storing or converting carbon, is being increasingly realised.

**Flooding and water logging** – not a benefit but a recurring issue and problem, which was examined and explored at the Briarlands meeting. We await the Heriot Watt report from which it is hoped on-going individual and collective alleviation measures may emerge.

The Partnership is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (a SCIO). It comprises a body of volunteers who live and work in the Carse and care about its future. Currently there are 4 action or focus groups endeavouring to take steps to maintain and enhance the foregoing benefits or issues.
