2010 - It began with a freeze and ended with a freeze

Our Spring 2010 edition mentioned that in January and February 2010 we experienced 37 days of sub zero temperatures with the lowest being -14C and the highest 11.4. Quite enough for one year but December last ignored our plea and gave us 15 days of sub zero temperatures.

For the whole of the 8 days from 1st to 8th December the mean temperature was -8C, with the lowest -19.8C and the highest -2.7C. Seventh December was the most arctic day with a "high" of -16.4C and a low of -19.6C. The average temperature for the whole of December was -3.5C. On a cheerier note we had only 22mm of rain throughout December and an average wind speed of 1.1mph.

Incidentally, with reference to wind turbines, the average wind speed in January and February last year was only 1.75mph. Don't think we will be seeing wind turbines at Blairdrummond! On another cheery note our scenery during the big freeze looked stunning as the photos show.

WIND FARMS - Love them or loathe them?

There is a project to erect 4 wind turbines on the Braes of Boquhapple, north of Thornhill Each Turbine would be about 55 m high with 3 blades each measuring 33m. One of these turbines is on offer to the Thornhill community, who would own it and the revenue derived from it, if they can finance the building and maintenance of the turbine. The building cost is about £800,000; but there are loans available for up to 90% of the cost and the annual revenue generated by a turbine is, thanks to Government subsidies, of the order of £200,000. This revenue is guaranteed for 25 years which is the anticipated life of a turbine So if all goes according to plan after 5 years approximately the loan could be paid off and thereafter, subject to maintenance and running costs, the community would have an income of £200,000 per annum for 20 years for community projects. Obviously if the loan was for a longer period than 5 years an income flow could begin in the first year.

The Project was approved at a public meeting of the Thornhill Community at the end of October but implementation requires, among other things, planning approval and successful wind monitoring for 12 months before installation can begin. Installation itself could take up to 12 months.

Few people find wind farms visually or naturally attractive. Many are sceptical about how efficient they are. Certainly when barometric pressure is high invariably winds are light or nonexistent and the blades cannot turn, just as they cannot turn if the wind is too strong. Unless we can store electricity cost effectively wind turbines can never be a total solution to our need for heat and light. Virtually every expert says that nuclear or coal fired solutions will be required to fill the gap, as even the more constant and assured tidal and wave turbines cannot produce sufficient power to do so. On the positive side for owners of wind turbines, and these could be communities, the monetary returns guaranteed for 25 years are significant and could be enormously beneficial if there is a strong community consensus on how the money should be spent. Blairdrummond Safari and Adventure Park has made it into the movies! "NEDS" was released in January. It is set in Glasgow in the 1970s and tells the story of the gang culture at that time. Filming had to be done early in the morning, before the Park opened to the public. NEDS has already picked up some awards including the best film at the San Sebastian Film Festival

Two of the Dot and Ailsa Watchers Group ("DAWGS") came to the Park to hand over the cheque, which will go to rhino conservation. In return all the DAWGs were awarded Platinum Adoption.

High Speed Broadband for Rural Forth Valley

Forth Valley and Lomond LEADER Local Action Group is delighted at the news that its bid to bring WiMAX broadband to the Forth Valley as part of the Scottish Government's Rural Broadband Challenge Fund was one of only five bids in Scotland to be approved by the Scottish Parliament in December 2010.

The project will put in place the necessary infrastructure to allow high speed broadband of between 2Mbps to 20 Mbps to be offered wirelessly as a commercial service which, as a minimum, will cover the communities of Tillicoultry, Alva East, Alloa West, Bandeath, Throsk, South Alloa, Cambusbarron and parts of rural south west Stirling. As a pilot, the exact reach of the signal won't be known until the equipment is in place.

One of the areas to be targeted is Touch Business centre at Cambusbarron. This means that the signal may well radiate from Stirling in an arc which could cover areas of Blairdrummond. For more information visit their website www.fvl.org.uk
