Camphill Blair Drummond – A 3rd Phase - Can we help its completion?

Camphill is one of the largest support networks for people with learning disabilities and mental health issues. The central belief is that everyone deserves respect, no matter what their ability. Internationally there are more than 100 Camphill communities in over 20 countries. In the UK, 43 communities support 1,450 individuals who live, learn and work alongside 1,750 employees and volunteers.

Camphill Blair Drummond was founded as a training college for adults with learning disabilities in 1976. Over the years the demand for daily learning workshops and residential care grew significantly. Sections of the impressive Blair Drummond House were turned into residential accommodation in response to the demand. Today Camphill Blair Drummond (CBD) supports 33 individuals from all

over Scotland. A further 33 day students attend each week from the surrounding areas. This number has increased from just 8 a few years ago, showing the continuing demand for the unique provision on offer.

Currently the third phase of Capital Development is underway. 4 purpose built workshops are already complete and in use and the first 2 residential houses are under construction. The third phase aims to build, fit-out and furnish a further 2 residential houses. By the time these are complete CBD will be able to support 42 residents.

Camphill aims to achieve social renewal through community living for people with complex learning disabilities. This approach is based on the work of Rudolph Steiner (1861-1925), a believer in cooperation and harmonization in the spheres of culture, politics and economics and respect for each individual.

Specifically CBD aims to provide a supportive and welcoming community life providing homes and meaningful daily activities for adults with learning disabilities. This innovative approach enables each individual to realize their full potential. A core element of this is providing activities that allow them to use and develop their skills and abilities.

The aim for the new Development is to achieve a layout where residential and workshop areas are separate. The new homes will be similar to a rural village setting, with the workshops close by.

The four workshops, already complete, are used by residents and day students at CBD. They are Craft, Estate work (logging, maintenance, mowing etc.), Woodwork and In Touch. The latter supports individuals with more severe and complex needs. Residents and day students are supported by staff and volunteers, in a ratio of around 1:1.

CBD has an Appeal to raise the £8.2m needed to complete their Development and are currently fundraising towards the final two residential houses. There are lots of ways that you can get involved and help them achieve this milestone. You can read about some of them in this issue of the Grapevine. 
Whisky Tasting

Editorial

Carse of Stirling Project -

The Project arose in response to the Scottish Government's Land Use Strategy. Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH) and the Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA) are leading the Project whose purpose is to demonstrate the value and benefits of taking a holistic approach to land use planning. The Project aims "to identify local priorities for land management".

In fact the area covered is bigger than just the Carse as we know it. The area covered takes in the land South of Hill of Row, Braes of Doune, Bridge of Allan, East of Port of Menteith, West of Bannockburn, North of Gargunnock, Kippen and Ballat Crossroads. Key elements of the aims, purpose and approach of the Project are – to identify priorities taking account the local environment, funding and climate change; involve land managers and stake holders; focus on the benefits derived from the land and support those who are delivering these benefits.

The intended outcome is an "Action Plan, used to deliver projects in keeping with local priorities and to raise awareness of the benefits that derive from the land".

There was, and possibly still is, some concern about the Project, namely, was it about creating new status for the area (e.g. a new National Park); about telling farmers what to do, or really part of a land reform review. We are assured by SNH and SEPA that it is not about any of these things. The result or findings from the Project should be an "Action Plan that sums up the benefits stemming from the land and the way that it is managed, having taken stock of the policies and influences that effect land use, landscape, and nature and the ability of deliver benefit". It should "involve and support those that manage and benefit from the land by identifying local priorities designed to maximise these benefits". The resulting Action Plan is to be "used to deliver projects in keeping local priorities influence make with and to or representations to partners, funders and policy makers".

On one view, the Project is a very positive step providing useful knowledge for the sensible managing and evolution of the Carse and surrounding area. Another view is that it is all a bit general and may be used by faceless people in government or government agencies to impose their views on how the area should be developed. Are you an optimist or a pessimist? It will be interesting to see how matters develop.

Thornhill and Blair Drummond Community Council

Entry to and exit from Kincardine in Menteith school and church -

Probably because Blair Drummond has no village, with streets, shops and the like, it features little in the Minutes of our Community Council. Many in our community would argue this is a very good thing. Others possibly feel belittled and ignored. Certainly on the plus side we have virtually no reported crime such as theft, drug offences, breach of the peace, or knife possession, which all do feature occasionally at Thornhill. Nor do we have problems with car parking and going over on pavements, which regularly upset the citizens of Thornhill. Nor problems over where the 30mph and 40mph zones should begin and end. Even poaching and hare coursing (mercifully rare) seem to occur nearer Doune and Thornhill, than Blair Drummond. On the Planning front our applications are for occasional new dwellings, storage sheds, hard standings and the like, which do not appear to raise significant visual or other environmental issues.

However, there is one matter which perhaps we should be pressing for, that is a one way system for people and cars to enter and exit from our school and church. The present single, narrow and quite steep road serving both entry and exit onto the increasingly busy A84, is arguably an accident waiting to happen, especially when roads are icy.

Should we not ensure the matter features in the Community Council Minutes until the matter is solved, by the present road being extended round the North side of the Church and a one-way system introduced? There is plenty of space to do so.

The Commonwealth Games in Scotland

So Glasgow 2014, and our home Commonwealth Games, is now next year. It's already at the point where in sport we call it a "short-term" target - athletes who expect to be there competing and winning medals should be, or need to be, very close to the required standard already - if they aren't, they won't make it in time......

We at Scottish Athletics - the National Governing Body of athletics, start the selection process for the team in April this year. We have a selection window until June 2014, where athletes have to prove themselves against set performance standards - so that means they have to run quicker than a set time, throw further than a set distance, or jump higher or longer than an agreed distance.

We set those standards looking at what performance it should take to get, in theory, to the final of that event in Glasgow - the statisticians have a field day! The athletes have to perform to that standard at least twice (we let the marathon runners off with just one run - generous aren't we?!), and of course they need to prove then that they are injury free and fit, in the run up to the Games itself.

At the last Commonwealth Games in Delhi 2010, we had 19 Scottish track and field athletes selected. In Glasgow, because we are "on the up" and have some young talent coming through, I hope to have over 30 Scottish athletes competing in Hampden Park, benefiting from the "Hampden Roar" athletics style!!! Will you be contributing to that Roar with a Blair Drummond element? I hope so! See you there!

Or what about volunteering? We have also heard so much about the London Games Makers..... 15,000 are needed for the Commonwealth in Glasgow. You need to move now though - apply on line on the glasgow2014 website (www.glasgow2014/volunteer) and you have until February 28th 2013 to do so. It will be hard work, and won't be suitable for everyone, but it is perhaps a once in a lifetime opportunity!

I'm always asked about medals of course ... how many will we win etc.? The reality is that Athletics is really competitive across the globe – you don't need a fancy velodrome, wind tunnels, or carbon fibre bikes (the money for which rules so many countries out of the

elite end of many sports) – you need a pair of shoes! And good lungs of course oh!, and most important actually – the right mentality! So, I'm avoiding the medal question here – with my neck in the noose of the media if I'm not careful We expect and predict that Scottish athletes in athletics will win **more than 2** medals. Two is what we have had at the last 3 Commonwealth Games – we will do better than that, or I'm looking for different gainful employment!

Kincardine-in-Menteith School link with Kapalamula Primary School, Malawi

Pupils at Kincardine-in-Menteith Primary are continuing their partnership with Kapalamula Primary, Malawi, by texting each other with the school mobiles. They are recording rainfall and average temperatures at the end of each month.

So far the results have been quite an eye opener for pupils! Here's what we have found out so far.

Below we have included the newsletter sent to us from Kapalamula School:

IMPACT OF SCHOOL FEEDING PROGRAME BY MARY'S MEALS AT KAPALAMULA SCHOOL

This feeding program started at Kapalamula School on 30th June 2009, after the training on how to prepare the porridge was conducted on 17th June 2009, which was attended by almost one hundred and fifteen parents.



OUTCOMES OF THE FEEDING PROGRAMMES

By June 2009, the enrolment of the school was 783 learners and changed to 1031 in the 2009 – 2010 school calendar year. The school enrolled many standard one learners as compared to the previous years

before the feeding program commenced.

School dropout especially in the infant and junior selections has been reduced. This is so because learners do come to school having known that there is something to eat here.

Frequent absenteeism by learners has also been reduced as observed from our monthly averages.

Malnutrition level amongst our learners has been reduced because the porridge is very nutritious indeed.

Learners are very active in class when they have eaten this porridge because they don't learn with hunger.

From 2009 number of learners who are selected to secondary school are increasing.

CHALLENGES OF THIS FEEDING PROGRAMME

Since this program run under Community Volunteer system, sometimes there is poor turn of people who come to cook the porridge for our learners. When this happens the whole school system is disturbed indeed. We are looking for other sources of funds, so that in the future the school may employ its own cooks to cook the porridge for our learners.

STAFF IMPROVEMENTS STATUS

In the 2011 – 2012 school year, there were only 15 members of staff, that is 4 Male teachers and eleven Female teachers. There has been a big improvement in that we are twenty three members of staff. We have 8 student teachers who are doing their teaching practices here. These student teachers are playing a great role at our school. In due course their teaching practice, they do also assist in teaching the learners in some classes.

2012 FORM ONE SELECTION

Our school enrolled 23 candidates who sat the 2012 primary school leaving certificate of Education. All of them passed and 8 were selected to various secondary schools. We are working very hard this year so that there can be more learners who may have access to secondary school selection.

Kincardine in Menteith Primary School

We start with the news of the appointment of Mrs Ann Maitland as Head Teacher. Mrs Maitland (who was Principal Teacher and class teacher of our P4-7 class) had been Acting Head Teacher while the selection process was ongoing for our new Head Teacher, following Mrs Anderson's move to another post. Miss Alison MacDougall has been teaching the P4-7 class and has been Acting Principal Teacher.

On Friday 25th January we held a Burns Celebration in school. Children and staff were dressed in tartan and danced to traditional Scottish music. This was followed by a Burns Supper of Leek and Potato Soup, scones and shortbread, all made by the children in school. We had an amendment to our school lunch menu with the addition of Haggis, Neeps and Tatties, which was enjoyed by quite a number of children. Certificates were awarded to the winners of the Burns Poetry competition. All the pupils took part in the preparation of the food, the dancing and the poetry competition and

we had a wonderful morning. The talent shone! Well done everyone!!

Next month the pupils are taking part in Micro-Tyco. This is a charity fund raising enterprise event in which the children are given a Seed Fund of £1. They have to come up with ideas to turn their pound into as much money as they can. The money raised will then be sent to the WildHearts Charity where it is invested in Micro-Finance in twenty-four countries around the world, taking Micro-Tyco participants on a journey that transforms them into dynamic wealth creators and global ethical investors. Seasonal Recipes

Easter Simnel Cake

Ingredients:

- 175g/6oz light muscavado sugar
- 175g/6oz butter, softened
- 175g/6oz self raising flour
- 3 large eggs
- 25g/1oz ground almonds
- 2 tbsp milk
- 100g/4oz sultanas
- 100g/4oz cherries, quartered, washed, and dried
- 100g/4oz dried apricots, snipped into small pieces
- 100g/4oz stem ginger, finely chopped
- 1 tsp mixed spice
- 2 tsp ground ginger
- 450g/1lb golden marzipan
- 3 tbsp apricot jam
- 1 egg, beaten

Method:

- 1. Preheat oven 160C/320F/Gas 3.
- 2. Grease and line the base and sides of an 20cm/8in deep, round cake tin with baking parchment
- 3. Measure all the cake ingredients into a large mixing bowl and beat well until thoroughly blended. Place half the mixture into the prepared tin and level the surface.
- 4. Take one third of the marzipan and roll into a circle the same size as the cake tin, place the circle on top of the cake mixture. Spoon the remaining mixture on top of the marzipan and level the surface.
- 5. Bake for about 1 ¾ to 2 hours or until golden brown and firm in the middle. If the cake is getting too brown you can loosely cover with foil. Allow the cake to cool in the tin before turning onto a cooling rack.

- 6. When the cake is cool brush the top with a little warmed apricot jam. Roll out half the remaining marzipan to the size of the cake and sit it on the top. Crimp the edges of the marzipan and make a lattice pattern in the centre of the marzipan using a sharp knife. Make 11 even sized balls from the remaining marzipan and arrange around the edge.
- 7. Brush with beaten egg and glaze under a hot grill for about five minutes, turning the cake round so it browns evenly, so the marzipan is tinged brown all over. (You can also do this with a blow torch if preferred)
- 8. You can decorate with some crystalized flowers, to do this brush some flowers such as narcissi or violets with lightly beaten egg white then sprinkle with caster sugar and allow to dry before placing in the middle of the cake.

Spiced Parsnip and Celeriac Soup

A lovely warming winter soup using the season's best vegetables Ingredients:

25g butter 1 onion chopped 2 stalks of celery 1 carrot, chopped 1 small celeriac, diced 2 parsnips, diced

2 tsp medium curry powder

2 litres vegetable or chicken stock

Method:

Melt butter in pot and gently fry onion, celery and carrot for 3-4 minutes. Add parsnips and celeriac and fry, covered for 5 mins. Add the curry powder and cook for a minute, then add the stock. Simmer for about 15 mins until tender. Blend soup and add a splash of milk or cream if desired.


