A BOOK FOR THE MILLENNIUM

George Bell, travel agent, author and publisher has lived for many years on the Blairdrummond Estates. Founder of the travel agency chain known as Bell Travel, the first outlet opened in 1969 in Bridge of Allan. This was the first of numerous offices throughout the North and East of Scotland

and the North of England. During the 20 years that George was Managing Director of the Company, ably assisted by his wife, June, and son, Kevin, Bell Travel grew to 17 offices and 85 staff members.

Ten years ago, when George relinquished his shareholding to new owners, he and his business partner, Susan Harris, lauched the Scottish Travel Agents News, the weekly magazine which still regularly services the whole of the Scottish Travel Trade from its offices in Bridge of Allan.

What George's staff. business associates, friends and neighbours did not know was that in every available moment of his spare time he studied philosophy, psychology, religions and the paranormal, as well keeping up to date with scientific developments, especially in the fields of physics, cosmology, medicine and archaeology. The result of all this research is a book called Why Are We Here? which George has written and has recently been published for the new Millennium.

The fasinating theories put forward in this book go a long way to present the reader with new and logical explanations for the meaning of our existance. It covers the span of billions of years from before the birth of the universe to the emergence and development of mankind.

THE STORY OF THE CARSE

In the first of a series of articles local historian, **Dr Ken Mackay**, plots the history of the Blairdrummond area

The Carse of Forth extends westwards from Stirling almost to Gartmore, about 15 miles long and on average miles broad. A thousand or so years ago, the Carse was a continuous swamp, a peat bog, with a general level around 50 -75 feet or less above the sea. It was a barrier to communication, crossed only by a handful of tracks radiating from two or three fords. In Gaelic, it was called *A Moine Fhlanrasach*, the latter being an ancient pre-Celtic name of uncertain significance, but clearly the origin of the modern version - *Flanders Moss.* (Two hundred years ago it was always written *Moss Flanders.*)

Why did the peat bog develop in the first place? And how did the Carse reach its present state of agricultural development? The first question will be tackled in this first article. The tale of the second question will be told in succeeding articles.

Let's go back 20,000 years - to the later stages of the last Ice Age. An ice-cap covered the Scottish Highlands perhaps to a depth of 1 kilometre. The Forth Valley was occupied by a glacier which stretched from Ben Lomond to beyond Cardross. Under the immense weight of the ice-cap, the land surface was depressed by around 50 to 100 feet, so that the glacier snout probably calved ice-bergs into the tidal arm of the sea which extended west from the 'gateway' islands which we now call Abbey Craig, Castle Rock and Craigforth. The evidence for this stage is two-fold; the alluvial clay or silt which underlies the peat, and the *terminal moraine* (the irregular line of hillocks) left by the glacier between Arnprior and Port of Menteith.

Warmer and drier conditions appear to have put paid to the last of the ice around ten thousand years ago. The sea still occupied the Carse area, but with the departure of the ice-cap, the general land-level started to rise. Mud-flats were exposed at low tide, and these would tend to be colonised by salt-tolerant plants, then by reeds, willows and alders, and later still - as soils built up and dried out - by grasses, heathers, hazels and birches.

Shortly before the beginning of the present era, the weather pattern seems to have become much wetter, to such an extent that the drainage on the level carse couldn't cope. The saturated soil supported the growth of mosses which flourished in the nutrient-poor rainwater. As the moss-cover increased, a layer of peat was formed - at a rate estimated at 1mm/year. Being highly water-absorbent, the mosses tended to lead to the

death of the trees, which in time were blown over by winter gales, and so became preserved within the developing peat-layer. In a matter of 2000 years, the peat reached a depth of over 6 feet. In places it was relatively firm and supported hummocks of heather, separated by hollows where water would collect, populated by floating mosses. In other parts, the dreaded *flow mosses*, the consistency would be reminiscent of porridge, and these would become notorious as 'bottomless mires'.

The Carse of Stirling had reached the status of *raised bog*, the condition so much valued today by naturalists, though a challenge both to agriculture and communication.....and an opportunity for developers, as we shall soon see!

Is it all chance? Is there a purpose? What is God in scientific terms? These are a few of the many questions addressed in this book which is a must for all inquiring minds.
