THE STORY OF THE CARSE (Part 3)


Family trees are quite popular these days. For most folk it is quite an achievement to trace your family back two hundred years. It can be different if your family have owned land for centuries, and ownership and succession are legally recorded.

Take the Muschets, for example. They owned the Barony of Burnbank between 1179 and 1670, and their connections spread far and wide. One of these, Dr J.S.Muschet, MD, (1805-86), lived at Birkhill House, Cambusbarron, and took a great interest in the Muschet monuments in the locality, believing himself to be the last of the line.

The oldest form of their name, in Norman-French, seems to have been de Montfort, and they were related to the Earls of Brittany. One of them came over to Hastings in 1066, and took the motto, 'I thank my God'. He was given the lands of Stansted to which he added Mountfitchet, another form of their name. A century later, another member of the family came north to the court of William the Lion(1165-1214) and was granted the lands of Burnbank, 4 miles west of Stirling. He would probably have built a wooden castle in the form of a motte (and there is a local candidate in the woods east of the old kirkyard). When stone castles came into fashion, the Muschets seem to have built one - the ruins known in the 18th century as 'the Auld Walls' - in the field just south of the old kirkyard. This may have been the home of Sir William de Montfichet, one of Bruce's commanders at the Battle of Bannockburn; he was one of the signatories of the Declaration of Arbroath in 1320, and served as Justiciar of Scotland.

In 1598, the current Muschet baron left the Castle for a more comfortable residence when Sir James and his wife Giles, daughter of Sir Walter Seton of Touch, built a mansion half a mile to the west, at Burnbank. Old estate plans show a modest house with a forecourt and gatehouse (sadly now only a heap of rubble). Near the house were an orchard, a garden and a foregarden (below).

In the latter, in 1647, the then lady of Burnbank, Margaret Drummond, was buried along with her three children; they were victims of the 'visitation' - the plague. The original gravestone, a ground-level slab, is still in situ within an iron railing. A Victorian upright stone repeats the inscription more legibly, and adds its donor's name - Dr J.S.Muschet, MD.



The gatehouse, incidentally, was also the location of a Muschet memorial, commemorating the 1598 move to the new mansion. It carried the Muschet-Seton coat-of-arms, the motto, the date, and their monogram. For a while it found refuge at the Mill of Torr, then at Birkhill House. It now lies, in poor condition and indecipherable, within the Muschet aisle at the back of the old kirkyard of Kincardine in Menteith. Fortunately I was able to photograph it back in 1972 (and who is that famous local resident with the stone - Ed)



The death of the last male heir to the Muschet lands in 1670 led to their sale to Sir John Drummond. Muschets continued to occupy other nearby properties, including Tollgeart, Mill of Torr and Craighead. One

more stone slab is worth mentioning, and you will find it above the door of the Muschet aisle aforementioned. Fortunately, it is well-preserved. It too carries a Muschet coat-of-arms, and the family motto; the stone is dated 1686. A skeleton carries a verse from the Book of Job, and a Latin inscription honours the progenitor of the Muschet line in Scotland. It likewise records the fact that it was renewed by Dr Muschet. Where was it originally? The initials on the stone are AMM. (The upper M means 'Magister' = Rev.) The minister of Larbert Parish in1686 was Rev,Archibald Muschet. Is this another example of a timely rescue by our friend Dr Muschet? [by Dr Ken Mackay]


