HALL IMPROVEMENTS

The Village Hall was built in the 1960's and has served the Community well since then. However, as we pass the Millennium, it is beginning to show signs of wear and tear. Some work needs to be considered to prolong its useful life and ensure that it is a facility that people will still want to use and enjoy for some time to come.

It has been suggested that the old roofing material, containing some asbestos, could be replaced with a better-insulated, modern material. Also new double-glazed window units and better insulation to the walls would greatly increase the warmth and comfort of the hall. Unfortunately, the kitchen and toilets are also in desperate need of renovation and renewal. However, the committee feels that with some investment, more people would use the hall, and that this in turn would maintain and promote the sense of community in and around Blairdrummond.

It is a condition of the Deed setting up the Hall that if it should fall into disrepair or cease to viable, the land should return to the original owner or his successor and the Community facility would be lost. To avoid this possibility the Committee is looking at various Grants available to help undertake the above works and would like to have advice and comment from the entire Community to ensure that this asset can be retained and improved.

KILL YOUR SPEED

Connie Hamlyn provided a copy of a letter written by Isobel MacAlpine to the Stirling Observer back in 1994 - its just as relevant today:

"The country lanes around here are used by slow moving tractors going about their daily work, elderly residents walking their dogs, children on bicycles, mums out walking with prams, children coming off school buses, young soldiers out from the Army Camp at the Drip Bridge, marching and sometimes jogging. It is a recognised and mapped cycle route. Children and adults riding their ponies and horses. My own family have had cars passing them at 50 mph whilst out on horseback, sometimes with as little as 12 inches to spare. Livestock, whether it be sheep, horses, cattle, etc., cannot be passed at speed, they are unpredictable and are not inanimate objects.

Chalmerston Road, Robertson Lane, Rossburn Lane, etc are regularly being driven like a speedtrack. These roads are single track with no passing places. One should always drive slowly (allow extra time) and safely in the country and always assume that there might be a herd of cattle or a stationary tractor round the next bend."

Attached to this issue is a leaflet advising drivers on how to approach horses on the road - please practice what it preaches.

THE STORY OF THE CARSE (Part 4)

The direct line of the Muschets of Burnbank died out in 1670, and the property passed to the Drummonds, Earls of Perth. A relative, George Drummond (1638 -1717), whose lands were at Blair in the Stormont (near Blairgowrie), negotiated an

exchange whereby, in 1684, he acquired the 'Ten Pound Land' around the east margin of the Moss of Drip. This included a string of settlements, some of whose names are recognisable today - Westwood, Camsdrainy, Miln of Camsdrainy, The Four Farms of the Baad, Gray Bonnocks, Cowden, Greenrigg, Hill of Drip, Ballgreen, Stanners, Lochtavell, and Easter and Wester Blackdub.


Tracks wandered rather aimlessly between the farms, much closer to the River Forth than the present Chalmerston Road which, as it happens, traces the edge of the Moss of Drip at that time. The King's Highway from Stirling to Doune was little better than a crooked series of farm tracks. Access from the east involved the use of a ferry, the Drip Coble. Across the Teith were two fords, the Broad ford and the Cadger's ford. The Forth had more ferries - there were cobles at Westwood, the Miln of Camsdrainy and the Baad.

It was the proprietor's responsibility to provide a grain mill for his tenants, and they in turn were thirled to that mill. George Drummond solved that problem in 1690 by having a 3-mile-long 'Miln Led' cut across the Great Moss of Kincairn and the Moss

of Drip to lead the water outflow from the 'Mill of Muck' at Kincairn to a mill-dam off the present Chalmerston Road, from where it descended to the Miln of Camsdrainy.

George planned to build himself a house on his estate, and initially chose a site at the Fir Park between Easter and Wester Blackdub. I wonder if he realised it would be prone to flooding in bad weather? However, he was able in 1714 to purchase the Barony of Kincairn, on the west of Ochtertyre estate. His new property included a farm called 'The Tore', possible referring to the motte-mound on which Lord Kames's obelisk stands today. Here he had constructed a fine house of classical design. The year was 1715, and the architect was to be the Earl of Mar - only he got involved in leading the Jacobite Rising of that year. The Drummonds, sitting on the fence, are supposed to have covered the initial foundations with branches and pretended they hadn't begun!

The design was taken over by Alexander McGill, and finished in 1719 ... by which time George Drummond had passed away, leaving his son James (1673-1739) to occupy the house and to improve the policies.



The foundation stone has been built into the rear wall of the existing Blairdrummond House.

The grounds around the House were laid out with great symmetry with avenues and parkland. The principal avenue pointed across Ochtertyre land towards Gillies Hill and terminated in a little arc of ground specially purchased from Ochtertyre, which can still be identified halfway up the Safari Park road to Mill of Torr.

In 1739, James Drummond died, and the property passed to his son, George (1705-65). He enlarged the estate in 1752 by purchasing the Barony of Burnbank, the original Muschet land. We owe him a special debt, because in 1754 he (and his neighbouring proprietors on Ochtertyre and Cardross) employed members of the noted surveying family, the Winters, to produce the large-scale plans of their property which give us such insight into the local landscape before the arrival of Lord Kames. Since the Rev. Catherine Hepburn left, we have had a series of interesting preachers at the Kirk, which included retired Ministers and lay preachers, one of whom, Dr. Drurie, who lives in Stirling, is a lecturer in History at Glasgow University.

So what is happening about a new Minister? The Stirling Presbytery visited us and Gargunnock and suggested that we should also link in a triple linkage, with Kilmadock in Doune. Although this would be a very large area for one Minister to look after, the current shortage of Ministers and the ever-rising cost of maintaining a church make such a proposition necessary. The congregation agreed with this; it has now been approved by the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh and the Presbytery in Stirling and, shortly, we should commence a programme to call a Minister to this triple linkage. The Manse to be used is going to be the one at Gargunnock. We shall receive services assistance, if required, subject to the approval of the Presbytery, as a service will be held at Kincardinein-Menteith every Sunday.

Amongst activities that have taken place recently, a most successful Dance was held in the Community Hall on Friday, 23rd February with Alex Fitzsimmons from Fintry Style playing reels etc. About 70 people were present, from 2 years upwards, and a great time was had by all.
