HALL IMPROVEMENTS - PUBLIC MEETING

Held on Tuesday 24th April 2001- 22 people attended

Analysis of survey

100% of those surveyed said that a hall in Blairdrummond was needed. 37.5% indicated a desire for further activities. 69% of these said they would be willing to assist with these activities.

After the replacement of the roof the two most important areas requiring attention, according to the results are the toilets and the kitchen facilities

Use of Hall

The current main users of the hall are the Cyclists, Youth Club, Aerobics, B.A.G.s, Church, School and the Pony Club. With the exception of the toilet and kitchen facilities most of these groups found the hall to be adequate for their current needs, although at times the aerobics class felt that the hall was a bit too small. However there is a demand for a Toddler group in the hall and lack of storage space would be a draw back although the Committee thought that they would be able to free up some space under the stage for storage. Though there seems to be a demand for sports activities in the hall these would be restricted due to the lack of ceiling height. If the demand is there then in any future plans for the hall this factor should also be considered along with storage needs. Council might be willing to start up new classes in the hall if numbers attending could be guaranteed.

Is a replacement necessary and how much will it cost?

The roof of the hall is made of asbestos and is now brittle and holed causing water damage in parts of the hall especially the toilets and roof space where fungus is growing. There is also no doubt that the toilet facilities are requiring modernisation and

that there are no disabled toilets or access available.

The Committee has visited Port of Menteith Hall. which is of a similar size and construction to our own Hall, in order to find out how their committee received Lottery Funding for an upgrade of their hall. They received a 100% grant from the National Lottery Grants to cover the cost of upgrading the existing hall and also to cover the cost of all new internal fittings. In total they applied for a grant of approx. £145,600 and the Committee offered to pay £2,000 towards this figure as a gesture of goodwill. Upgrading of their hall included putting on a new roof, building an outer skin, insulation, double glazing, disabled toilets, toilets and a kitchen. The cost of this was £98,000 + VAT + £10,000 for contingencies. The remainder of the grant was to cover all internal fittings including furniture, crockery &cutlery, office equipment, curtains, lighting, etc. professional fees were also included. A 100% grant was received. It is unlikely that the running costs of the upgraded hall are any higher than the old hall due to improved insulation, etc. Port of Menteith was also fortunate in having an architect and an accountant living in the area. If the bid for Lottery funding had been unsuccessful then the architect would waive his fee. The accountant was required to keep control of the funding during the upgrade. They also had one very dedicated individual who was willing to give up a lot of her time to oversee the building works.

Strathyre has recently built a new hall and we are awaiting information on the cost of this. Balquidder has also erected a new hall with Lottery funding. Thornhills' new hall is much bigger than we would require and also has high running costs.

Funding

It was felt that we should try to apply for funding from the National Lottery to build a new hall as while the new hall was being built we could still use the old hall. However this would depend on the local Planning Department having no objections to our plans. One major cost in this application will be architects' fees and it was felt that we cannot afford the cost of fees for an unsuccessful bid. We would hope to be able to approach someone who could offer their skills on a similar basis to those of the Port of Menteith architect. Although it has been agreed that we should apply for this grant it should be noted that we might not be successful as more halls are now looking for funding through this scheme due to Port of Menteiths' award.

Alternative funding

Other funding is available by raising a sum which will then be matched by Central region and then this total would be further matched by the Scottish Office. There are also various other methods of funding available which will be looked into if the Lottery bid fails e.g. Stirling Volunteers Association; fundraising; Stirling Council grants. We would also have to prioritise any improvements if funding is not forthcoming.

Other suggestions

Storage problems could be solved by erecting a container at the side of the hall, though doubts were expressed over its' security. Another suggestion was to build an all weather surface with floodlighting on part of the car park which would allow various groups and individuals from the area to have some sports facilities.

Future

Now that a proportion of the local community has expressed an interest in the future of the hall we hope that we can encourage even more community involvement in the future.

MRS BEATON'S FISH DISHS

A couple of great fish recipes from Amy Beaton:

Smoked Mackerel Pate/Dip (serves 4)

225g (8oz) hot smoked mackerel fillets, skinned 140ml (¼ pint) fromage frais 2/3 tsp horseradish sauce

1 tbs chopped parsley squeeze of lemon juice

 Serve with oatcakes, melba toast, strips of carrot/peppers or tortilla chips

Amy says ... mackerel is high in Omega 3 fatty acids which have a lowering effect on blood fats, helping to reduce risk of heart disease.

"Hot" refers to the temperature used during smoking process which means the fish is already cooked

Italian Smoked Fish

450g (11b) smoked cod or haddock fillets, skinned & cubed

10ml (1 dsp) sunflower oil

1 small onion, chopped

1 red pepper, deseeded & chopped


75q (3oz) button mushrooms, halved

125g (4oz) low fat soft cheese with garlic & herbs 100ml (4 fl oz) milk

125q (4oz) pasta, cooked

fresh chopped parsley, to garnish

- Heat the oil in a shallow non stick pan. Cook the onion, pepper and mushrooms for 3-4 minutes
- Add the cheese, milk and fish. Cover and simmer for 8-10 minutes, stirring occasionally
- Stir in the cooked pasta, heat through for 1-2 minutes
- Garnish with parsley and serve
