Blair Drummond Ladies

In August we had the pleasure of interviewing 4 local farmers' wives, whilst we all enjoyed having morning coffee and cakes! Marjorie Bryce, Janet Graham, Muriel Inglis & Betty Mitchell, share much in common, have a wealth of local knowledge and all have a great sense of humour.

Question. We asked – Were they brought up in this area, how they met their husband, what was their role on the farm and would they have preferred another role?

Answers.

Marjorie was born at Powbridge, Airth but her school friend stayed at Cambusdrennie Farm, so she was often in this area. Bill Bryce took Marjorie and her friend to Young Farmers dances as they couldn't drive and he picked up Tommy Bryce too. Marjorie (age 27years), after 5 years engagement, married Tommy in 1962 and moved into Chalmerston, where they still are today.

As there were a lot more workmen on farms then, Marjorie fed the men and looked after the children as they came along. Her father in law did the bookwork and Marjorie kept hens for pocket money. She enjoyed her role in the business very much.

Janet was born at West Drip Farm, the eldest of 5 girls. She has never stayed more than 2.5 miles from where she was born, with the exception of 4 years when she lived at Causewayhead! She came to live at Rossburn Lane Farm after she married (aged 22years) George in 1957 and all her children were born there, before moving back to West Drip when her parents retired.

As both were from Blair Drummond it had originally been a gradual getting to know one another with George, as Janet was friendly with his sister. George was the 3rd son in the family and because he was shy he asked his oldest brother, on his behalf, to ask Janet to go out on a date with him!

On the farm she was part of the team and even after her son John was born one June, she was out helping in the fields that summer. She also tended to the hens. Her role was much a continuation of her pre-marriage life. In later years she took in caravans for storage over the winter and then did B & B (in caravans) for 40 years.

Muriel was born in the Callander area and the family moved around several farms when the children were young. They moved to Norrieston Farm, Thornhill in 1953 from Kinloch Rannoch. Muriel wonders if perhaps her father thought there were more opportunities in this area for his family of 7 to meet their future wives/husbands! The previous owners of Norrieston were the Jamiesons, who were aunt and uncle of John Inglis her future husband.

Engaged for just under a year, Muriel (aged 28 years) and John moved to Briarlands Farm after they married in 1961. In fact four of the family were married within 6 months!

Muriel raised the family and helped with the farming at first but later on had a job working for the Muir family at Blair Drummond House, for a few hours a week, which she thoroughly enjoyed and felt that it enhanced her life. She also did B & B in the farmhouse for 25 years.

Betty was born at West Carse Farm, and moved to the Offers Farm in 1953 when she married (20years old) her husband Archie, following a short engagement. Her husband had previously worked on another farm but left, under doctors orders, as he had been ill with pleurisy and pneumonia. He moved into the town and got a job as a grain merchant, meeting Betty whilst trying to sell grain to her father.

Archie did not enjoy selling and when the previous tenants at Offers Farm left, he took over the tenancy in 1950. Betty enjoyed her life working alongside her Best Friend and wouldn't have changed anything! She was often called on to help on the farm, as well as feeding the men and taking care of the family. There were 3 men to feed every day, with up to 20 men on mill days!

When she first moved to Offers there was no electricity and the water was pumped from the Forth into a tank but there was a toilet in the house! One of Betty's happy memories was the family taking walks around their fields on Sunday evenings.

Question. We then asked the ladies if, for their children, they had any anxieties?

Answers.

They all agreed that things had worked out well for their families. None had been pressured into farming and, as there were plenty of workers still employed on farms then, they didn't need the family to stay at home and work. Each of the women were happy to have their family make their own choices. And all thought there were more opportunities and choices for their family than for the parent generation.

The ladies commented that nowadays, thanks to mechanisation, one man can do the work of six.

Question. Do you think life is harder for farming families nowadays? **Answers.**

It's definitely harder for farming families today and a very different life. As a result many people are not as content as in years gone by, when overall it was a hard but happy life in farming.

Because there were more farm workers, full time as well as seasonal, more jobs around the farm got done. The hedges were always cut and tapered, weeds got rid of and ditches cleared. The countryside was better cared for and everyone had more 'respect' for it.

Today there is so much paperwork to be completed and too many rules – such as farmers can't cut hedges until September etc. so their hands are often tied.

Computer communication has hugely changed farming too.

Marjory Bryce's father said that there couldn't be as many changes in his second 50 years as there had been in the first. But things *have* changed and sometimes not for the better!

Question. What are the biggest changes?

Answers

More houses. Lots of holiday lets. Changes to planning regulations have had a major impact. More cyclists on roads. The right to roam almost anywhere. People not always considerate when they come out to the country, they could give more thought to what they are doing and where they are.

Question. And finally, we asked are there changes you would like to see in the wider community?

Answers.

Common courtesy. Respect for others than themselves. Less reliance on TV and internet.

In conclusion everyone was very content with the life they have had farming in Blair Drummond and wouldn't have changed a thing.

It was a pleasure to talk with the ladies and we would like to thank them for their time and insights.

The Great British Beach Clean 2017

On the 18th September 2017 the whole school went to North Berwick to take part in the Great British Beach Clean. The school have adopted a bit of the beach in North Berwick so we go every year, to do a beach clean to help the environment and sea creatures.

When we arrived at North Berwick, Andrew from the Sea Bird Centre met us outside. Then he took us inside and we had our snack then he talked to us about rock pooling. Next Andrew took us down to the rocky part of the beach and we all walked around lifting up small rocks looking for sea creatures. We all had to walk because if you ran you could have slipped and been hurt on the rocks. All I could find was sea snails and some tiny fast swimming fish in the rock pools.





Some people were lucky enough to find crabs. I couldn't find any but I wish I had. Also we found some sea anemones. We collected all the sea creatures that we found in a plastic tray filled with sea water, so that everyone could have a look at them. At the end of the morning we released all the creatures back into the sea. After that Andrew took us back up to the Sea Bird Centre and we had our lunch.

After lunch we went down to the part of the beach that we had adopted to do the beach clean. Andrew took us down and we met up with Catherine from the Marine Conservation Society and she took some pictures of us holding our litter pickers.

Finally we started our beach clean. We had to measure out 100 metres along the beach. Then we separated into 2 groups and we started cleaning the beach. Eventually the two groups met in the middle. We

collected all sorts of stuff, for example: plastic bottles, bottle caps, metal, cigarette butts, rope, glass, cotton buds, plastic bags, pottery, nets, paper and sweetie wrappers.

A list of all the items that we found goes to the Scottish Government, which in turn helps government enforce new Recent laws. laws include charging 5p for plastic bags in shops and the new proposal of having money refunded for plastic bottle returns. After we had collected the rubbish and logged



what we had found on our record sheets, it was time to jump back on the bus and return to school.

Weather Facts

So, here are the weather stats from local farmer Alan Brisbane. Now before you all choke on your coffee, I'd like to point out that under average conditions we would expect 40 dry days during July, August and September, this year we have had only 16!! We are on course though for a drier than average year, as January, April, May, July, August and September recorded below average rainfall.... April was one of the lowest ever with a mere 7.6mm

Hay and harvest on the Carse has been incredibly tricky this year, as we have had so few dry days together. This is evident when you notice fields with straw still lying. Many farmers have also got their cattle back in the sheds earlier than normal, as the fields are now too wet to support them. So, looking ahead, we hope the experts are proved wrong, and we move away from the warm damp conditions we have experienced recently!

Thornhill and Blair Drummond Community Council

A meeting of the Community Council was held on 26th September in Thornhill Primary School. A range of local issues were discussed.

Roads

Traffic flow through Thornhill continues to be an issue of local concern. The 'nib' has not proved very effective in regulating the traffic and preventing vehicles from mounting the pavement to allow them to pass each other. Although the Community Council had suggested a solution (a part-time parking restriction on one side of the road), this has not proved acceptable to the residents, and we are having to think again.

Potential improvements on the A84, to ease both the traffic and congestion problems by the Safari Park/Briarlands junction, are once again under discussion by Stirling Council.

Police Matters

Local concerns were raised that the 101 telephone service is not proving to be a reliable means of contacting the police on no-critical matters.

Car crime has been noted, especially for vehicles which are left unattended in secluded car parks. Extra attention and patrols are being arranged by the police as a deterrent.

Stirling Council

A full review is being called to address the 'Services Allocation Model'. A Working Group is being called in the meantime to assist in getting things going.

The waste collection policy for rural, road-end collections is similarly being reviewed. At present, the policy is for housing groups of less than 15 to be road-end serviced.

Other Matters

The lack of routine nursing attendance at the Thornhill Health Centre is causing concerns in the village. Residents have to travel to Doune to see the nurse. A public meeting is being held to discuss the matter.

Discussions are underway to see if the DRT (i.e. Demand Responsive Transport) system can be extended to better service the needs of local community residents.

Obituary - Alistair Durie



Our community and many others suffered a sad loss on the death of Alistair Durie on 5th October. Just before his death Alistair was asked how he would like to be remembered. He replied 'a life in which as much as possible was done'. This, for sure, is how we will

remember him. His activities and commitments were numerous and his enthusiasm boundless.

Dr Durie was a popular lecturer on Economic History, firstly at the University of Aberdeen, then Glasgow and finally Stirling, where he was also on the academic staff of the Open University. He was an exceptional Lay Preacher, regularly conducting services at our own Kincardine in Menteith Church, where he was a much loved Elder. But Alistair took services all over this area - Buchlyvie, Fintry, and Kippen to name but three, and was popular wherever he went, as evidenced by the number of friends from numerous churches at his funeral service. The service was also packed with friends from his University connections and those with whom he shot. Shooting was a great passion of Alistair's - almost an obsession – as were his dogs and knowledgeable love of the countryside. Sport too was another passion, whether participating at cricket or on the squash court, or watching rugby or other sports on TV. Appropriately for a Senior Lecturer Alistair was the author of several books and papers, on banking, medicine, travel and tourism. To the foregoing impressive list of activities one should also add his playing bridge, singing in two choirs and being a lay assessor with the Law Society of Scotland, participating in their committees on Client Care, Guarantee Fund and Professional Conduct.

Alistair's characteristics included an element of mischievousness. He enjoyed poking fun at any pomposity or pretentiousness in persons or institutions and his restless intelligence could very occasionally make him difficult but when all is weighted on the scales, they came down heavily and massively on the side of a person intelligent, gifted and always fun to be with. Every time one met Alistair there was laughter and one came away feeling invigorated.

Along with Kate his wife, and his children Alex and Ruth, together with all who knew him, we will miss a person who certainly did in his life as much as possible and helped make the world a better place.



The Rev's Remembrance: Saved!



I was brought up in North Berwick on the east coast and one stormy Saturday back in the '60s, at the age of 12, I was playing with friends down at the harbour. There were some

great waves battering the shore that day. Running along the sea-wall between the waves, trying not to get wet was one way local boys displayed their bravado (or was it stupidity?). It was great fun...that was until I faltered, slipped on the seaweed, fell and ended up on the wrong side of the wall in amongst the waves and water. Unable to swim at that time, I was in deep trouble. It was a young soldier, home on leave, who dived in and dragged me out, cold and shaken onto the rocks. It did nothing for his dedicated-follower-of-fashion civvy-outfit.

My father showed his huge sense of relief at his son's rescue, in an unexpected and what would now be called, unacceptable way: and with my ear still ringing the following day, I was marched along to the home of the soldier to deliver a well-rehearsed fulsome apology and a thank-you card with two £10 notes tucked inside. His response too was a bit unexpected. He looked at me, then the ruined winkle-picker shoes, then back at me and grunted, "Just make sure you were worth saving!"

Each year around this time as I stand beside a war memorial and survey the names of those who never returned home from war, I remember these words: "Just make sure you were worth saving." These words also come sharply into focus each time I hear or read the gospel story of Jesus of Nazareth. "Make sure you were worth saving!"

Remembering what has been done for us by others isn't about living in the past; it can be what enables us to be our best today and tomorrow, and it's never too late to be better!

Vaccines Update

Flu Vaccine

Available for patients who are 65 years and over, or in an 'At Risk' group. If you missed our Drop-in Clinics please make an appointment with one of the nurses, at a time that suits you.

If you would like to have flu injection and are not in an 'At Risk' group, or 65 years old, then you should obtain one privately from one of our local pharmacies. Ask at the Woodside Pharmacy. A vaccine costs approximately £10 – 12.

Child Nasal Flu Vaccine

Please make an appointment with Nurse Lynne Bryce, if your child requires a nasal flu vaccine. This is for children aged 2 - 5 years. It applies to children who reached 2 years of age by 01/09/2017.

Pneumococcal Vaccine

Patients are entitled to a one-off pneumococcal vaccine from the age of 65 years, or if you are in an 'At Risk' group. If you wish more information, or are unsure if you have received it previously, please phone the Health Centre.

Shingles Vaccine

We have been offering the Shingles vaccine for several years now. Patients who reached the age of 70 years by 01/09/2017 are entitled to one. If you think you missed the opportunity to have this vaccine, then we can check if you are still eligible. This is a one-off vaccine. Please phone the Health Centre to enquire.

There is a useful web site with information about shingles on 'Immunisation Scotland Shingles 2017'. Look for the easy-to-use eligibility calculator tool which can tell you immediately, when you insert your date of birth, whether you can have the vaccine or not.

There is currently a global shortage of Hep A vaccine, which is causing problems for anyone travelling abroad.
